The Advanced Education Seminar (AES) is a one-day interactive learning experience designed for anesthesia educators who wish to improve the effectiveness of their clinical teaching. Connecting with elements of the SEA Workshop on Teaching, the AES will build on the taxonomy of educational objectives in the affective domain as they pertain to the four advanced ACGME competencies: practice-based learning and improvement, professionalism, interpersonal and communication skills, and systems-based practice. Attendees, in small group activities and discussions, will focus on designing curricula using the specific methods explored during this workshop. Psychometric inventories will be used to examine individual teaching and leadership styles and how to improve the scope of their practices. An open systems approach will be used to identify and assess challenges to clinical teaching in anesthesiology. A special effort will be made to relate these techniques to different clinical teaching environments, evaluation tools, and evidence based medical education.
